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What Is Percocet?

All tablets are immediate-release, typically lasting 4 to 6 hours.

Dosage and Administration

- Usual adult dose: 1 tablet every 4 to 6 hours as needed for pain.
- Maximum daily limit: No more than 12 tablets or 4,000 mg of acetaminophen in 24 hours.

Important guidelines:

- Take exactly as prescribed.
- Swallow tablets whole with water.

Signs of Percocet Misuse or Addiction
